

Key Initiatives

Priority Projects

In 2023 our Priority Project strengths have continued to be with the Taiao and Rongomaiwahine-tanga.

We have developed a new and exciting relationship with the Ministry of Education which is facilitating the development of resources that tell our stories. "For Mahia by Mahia"

Te Puna Waiora o Nukutaurua and our Takutaimoana claim are national leaders in Wai-maori and Wai-tai Kaupapa.

Our kaimahi have been working hard behind the scenes gathering data to develop our housing plan, Kainga-tahi. The housing plan was presented to Minister Jackson at Wellington in May which precipitated numerous relationships that are beginning to make whānau housing a reality.

The "Build Enterprises" and "Develop Assets" have been relatively slow over the last 12 months due mainly to the technicalities of the DSP process. Two hi-lights in this space is our partnership with DoC and Rakaipaaka in the redevelopment of Morere as well as the continued growth of our Community Services business.

Performance

In terms of performance our organisation has continued to be strong at 6 of the 8 Criteria. Good Engagement with our whānau and broader community creates the opportunities to give back. The broad community response to Cyclone Gabrielle is a case in point.

Along with local Mahia community engagement there has also been growth in our beneficiaries which now stands at 1665 registered beneficiaries.

The Success of our Service business has created growth in jobs for our people at Mahia.

Our kaimahi execution in their individual roles and projects has rewarded our organisation with contract extensions in time and size. Our reputation for solid delivery has also led to new contract opportunities.

Unfortunately, rapid organisational growth has come with "growing pains" resulting in a slight reduction in "Compliance with our good way of working". Our board has responded by seeking to replace the part-time Iwi Manager role with a full-time CEO, which should see a return to green in the new year.

Our board has put a lot of effort into governance which has seen a gradual turn around over the last 12 months. This success is epitomised by monthly board meeting lengths consistently being 2 hours or less. We aim to continue this with the new incoming Trustees.

The "Protection and growth of our assets" is performing poorly due to the Tātau Tātau Kāhui Beneficial Unit (KBU) value reduction of \$778k which is significantly larger than the previous years \$32k KBU value reduction. 2 Years of poor performance hi-lights our future's dependence on the Tātau Tātau Commercial Board's performance.





HE POUTAMA RANGATAHI

Our HPR program supports Rangatahi aged 16 to 24 in finding employment or furthering their education. We also assist them in obtaining licenses, preparing resumes, gaining work experience, and learning intangible skills in order to pursue a career in what they desire. To find Rangatahi, they must initially be in N.E.E.T (not in employment, education, or training). Once this is established we are then ready to collaborate. Here are some statistics to help you understand how we're performing.



Five of our Rangatahi in N.E.E.T are being transitioned into employment with Rongomaiwahine lwi Trust, under various contracts. Once this is implemented, there will be 9 Rangatahi in pastoral care during a 6-month period from the dates they started. We provide them with support and any supplies they may require to sustain full time employment.



Since March of this year, our license connection has been supporting us, and we have formed a lovely relationship with her. She only promotes Rangatahi who demonstrate devotion and perseverance, as evidenced by her 98% passing rate.

Gym: 8 Rangatahi

We have eight dedicated rangatahi who have discovered that the gym helps with the tinana and hinengaro, and the results are really visible. We make a weekly trip to Wairoa Community Centre, which also allows them to conduct their shopping, pay bills, and attend appointments.

Upcoming Workshops

We are scheduled for our Marae Kawa day here at Tuahuru Marae in December, where we will learn the protocols of our Marae, how to prepare a feast, and how make fry bread.

In the coming months, we will conduct a workshop for Rangatahi on how to maintain their vehicles, as well as booking them in for first aid and health and safety training.

Food distribution will carry on when we have been given extra food. We have noticed a decline in this, supergrans suppliers have reduced their donations. We eagerly await positive news and updates regarding Kai support. The limited kai we did collect, 291 individuals from 98 whanau received this.

A fantastic whanau day held for our community organised at Mahia Beach alongside our Kaimahi. We made full use of all the water activity equipment we have, and we also arranged a BBQ

COMMUNITY GYM

Due to the recent extreme weather events, there have been a few little setbacks with our gym. However, work is still ongoing, and we have high hopes that it will be finished before the year ends. Once enclosed we will be able to install and arrange all equipment.

HUI/COURSES

We have participated in numerous hui & courses Grow Safe, He Powhiri Poutama, MSD Connectors & SORT just to name a few to receive guidance on how to best support our whanau and community.

HOUSING

MAARA KAI – COMMUNITY GARDEN

Through connections made with Cedenco we were able to obtain apple bins for raised gardens beds.

We were able to fill 27 bins with planting material (lined, weed mat & soil) thanks to a recent Kaimahi team building that took place on site. Members of the community have already stopped by to plant seedlings, which are already thriving.

We will also work alongside different organisations, businesses and other roopu to help flourish & nurture our garden

Report: Emergency Response Kaimahi

Deliverables or other criteria

Engagement with various community partners:

Engagement has commenced with Local Police, Local Government Council Civil Defence – Wairoa District Council & Gisborne City Council, Fire Emergency NZ, St Johns Ambulance, Mahia Hauora, Rocket Lab, Local Schools, Marae representatives, local businesses, Churches, Clubs & Community members.

Reflection on recent emergency events have identified areas needed for improvement.

Due to recent weather events and road closures, the new date for "Mahia Community Resilience Planning" has been postponed to Wednesday 29 November 2023 at the Mahia Golf Club at 6pm.

Emergency Response awareness achieved by participating in National Shakeout Day held on 19th October 2023 at 9.30am for earthquake response and Tsunami Hikoi which was shared on Rongomaiwahine lwi Trust Facebook page and various online platforms.

Stock Resilience Containers with Emergency Resources

Two Resilience Containers 20 foot have been sourced and purchased from Container Space in Gisborne. Delivery and placement completed by Gisborne Hiabs.

Recommendations received from funding provider - Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints to stock emergency items from their experience in responding to Christchurch earthquakes. Have received suggestions from Hawkes Bay Emergency Management for Flood/Tsunami events emergencies.

Quotes have been sourced from Mitre 10 and Bunnings to stock containers with Emergency Items. Larger items yet to be sourced.



Large Aerial Maps have been sourced from Hawkes Bay Regional Council to stock each container.



Expected progress in next quarter

After identifying members for Mahia Resilience Committee and defining roles and responsibilities, then create a Terms of Reference for resilience containers including maintenance plan for each. Possible master key lock system upgrade

Schedule regular 6 monthly meetings for Mahia Resilience Committee

Create various online chat groups for various response groups

Identify key holders of existing resilience containers and stocktake current inventories.

Identify medical expertise in the community and confirm support during emergencies

Develop Search and Rescue teams within the community and locate local defibrillators and ensure equipment is updated online with defib locator.

Identify working bee groups in the event of damage caused by emergency event

Request training for staff to increase emergency response capabilities including SIM, Drone operation, first aid emergency response, equipment users and PPE

Identify vulnerable individuals within the community (including elderly, young children and disabled) and create group in TikiOS database

Develop resilience workshops to encourage food preservation methods and storage



An incentive to increase community member participation with a Whanau Grab and Go Bag displaying the various emergency items needed for whanau for the first 72 hours to increase awareness and motivation for whanau resilience planning.



OUR MAHI



Over the last 3 months we have scanned in over 3000 pages of documents relating to the history of our whenua.



We have conducted in depth research through the scanned documents and online resources to ensure the accuracy of our work.



Maintained a connection with our whānau to make sure that we hear their stories and connection to the whenua.



Deep dive into the Mangaopuraka block for the Cultural Impact report, including research into whakapapa and historical documents



Mapped out the Māhia Peninsula with the original owners that were recorded in the land court along with additional names contributed by our whānau

WHAT NEXT?

Our next steps include more recording of the stories and knowledge from our pākeke, continuing to meet with our whanau to hear their unique stories, and fleshing out the work we have already completed with more polish and refinement. We will continue to collect the priceless historical documents and develop ways to have these compiled for our whānau.



OUR GOALS

We want to have a complete compilation and knowledge of our documented history and as much of the oral history as we can collect. We also want a proprietary map of our peninsula with an ever growing database of historical landmarks and interest points



OUR PROGRESS

We are constantly gathering documents and have many of the documents that are publicly available, we are working on editing these documents to improve readability. Our map of Māhia already has multiple layers of data with ongoing work on additional layers in progress.



OUR FUTURE

We are in communication with the land court to acquire a digital copy of the minute books, if this isn't possible we will gather it ourselves. We are also working on ways to record our stories and have them permanently available to all our whanau! Our team has grown and has allowed us to dramatically increase the scope of our work.

OUR RESPONSIBILITIES ARE INCLUSIVE OF BUT NOT RESTRICTED TO:

Baiting

- Rebaiting
- Checking traps
- Documentation of events via Trap NZ application.

Rebaiting

We are provided with dehydrated rabbit and salmon oil to rebait traps. Our preference as the most effective bait would be eggs as they have proven to most effectively attract the pests. With the exception of eggs, cat food has proved a successful addition to the baiting options.

Checking traps

When checking traps the weather is our main concern. When tracks are wet, there is a tendency to cause damage to the whenua we are accessing. This is an area I would suggest we prioritise to maintain and strengthen relationships with the farmers who allow us access to their properties. A subsequent consequence as I see it is the likelihood we are denied access to these properties to continue to achieve our objectives.


